This report highlights some of the ways your generosity catalyzed change and improved wellbeing for Indigenous women and their communities in 2018–2019.



Growing Food & Incomes: 71 Caretakers of Mother Earth are teaching and applying strategies to grow and raise more food ecologically on family farms.



Advancing Rights of Women & Children: 54 MILPA coordinators and promoters are advancing rights of women and increasing their participation in community decision-making.



Elevating Indigenous Voices: 468 radio programs on topics like agroecology, health, and women's rights and leadership were broadcast to over 30,000 people.

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GROWING FOOD & INCOMES

Agroecology Project



Indigenous families in Chiapas hunger for food and opportunities.

Families frequently report food scarcity between harvests, changing climate conditions that ruin crops, limited access to markets, and shortage of cash to pay medical expenses and school fees.

Your support equips women and their families with skills to:

- Grow and raise more food ecologically
- Earn income by selling products in local markets
- Manage earnings through savings and credit cooperatives



IN 2018-2019 your donations catalyzed change by:

- Activating 42 new Caretakers of Mother Earth (agroecology promoters) to apply what they learned on their family farms
- Engaging 86 Caretakers of Mother Earth (including 73 women) in 4 savings and credit cooperatives, where they met their savings goals and supported each other with low-interest loans
- **Training** 29 graduates from the agroecology certificate program to serve as teacher-facilitators and give workshops at various community agroecology training centers in the region
- **Supporting** 16 women Caretakers of Mother Earth to lead groups of 10-15 women in their communities to grow vegetables, sell produce and bread, and manage earnings
- Broadcasting 16 programs on agroecology to over 30,000 people through "Ach' Lequilc'op" Indigenous community radio

IN 2019-2020 your support will build on these successes to engage more Indigenous women to grow food ecologically and **increase productivity on their family farms**; support women-led family and group projects to **increase incomes and decision-making power**; and facilitate savings and credit cooperatives to provide access to **low-interest loans to fuel economic initiatives**.

ADVANCING RIGHTS OF WOMEN & CHILDREN MILPA Project



Indigenous women in Chiapas face high rates of violence. This violence is fueled by alcoholism and generations of social inequities, serious obstacles to women who seek full participation in family and community life.

Your generous support of the MILPA Project confronts these challenges by equipping Indigenous women with skills to advocate for their rights, represent women in cases of violence, and serve as leaders in community government.

IN 2018-2019 your generosity changed the equation in Chiapas by:

- Training 31 women rights promoters to advance rights of women and increase their participation in community life
- Facilitating 23 women coordinators to participate in regional assemblies to promote the rights of women
- Producing twice-monthly know-your-rights radio shows to a listening audience of over 30,000
- · Supporting 6 women representatives serving in community councils in two rural municipalities
- Establishing 7 committees of women conflict mediators to represent and attend to women who have suffered violence

2019-2020 your donations will deepen this work, fueling projects focused on engaging Indigenous women as promoters, mediators and community representatives to advance rights of women, build communities free from violence, and support emotional and psychological healing of women and girls.

Your generosity supports Indigenous community radio to strengthen the cultures and languages of Chiapas' Original Peoples, providing information and news to engage and encourage civic participation.

IN 2018-2019 your donations elevated and amplified Indigenous voices by:

- Broadcasting 468 programs on relevant topics such as agroecology, health, and women's rights and leadership
- Training 20 volunteers to conduct interviews, gather stories and produce radio broadcasts in outlying villages
- Strengthening culture and tradition through programs featuring elders who shared fables, histories and regional recipes
- Organizing communication strategies to coordinate educational, news and cultural programming for social change
- Equipping 17 volunteers with skills to collect and manage documents in the library to protect Indigenous knowledge

IN 2019-2020 your donations will continue to support Indigenous community radio, a powerful vehicle for education and collective participation. A special focus of this work will be to engage youth as volunteer radialistas to gather local news and cultural history by interviewing community elders.
